
Created in 1993 the AIR Program has set out to create a greater future for our American Indian Community through education.

Our 2022 Student Leadership Awardees



Areaya Fernandez (Pechanga Band of Luiseño Indians)

I am a Pechanga Tribal Member from Temecula, California, and I am currently 17 years old. I enjoy staying active in my Pechanga community by taking part in several cultural activities. I have attended several Native American youth empowerment conferences, such as Dream the Impossible, Mid UNITY, and the National UNITY Conference. These conferences bring youth from all across the country to collaborate on current issues facing Native youth. In addition to this, I have been a part of the Indigenous Peoples Club, at Great Oak High School, for three consecutive years. I have also participated in the Pechanga Youth Traditional Knowledge Program for five years, where I work with other teens to learn more about my ancestors and our traditional ways. I continue to show my commitment to my community by running to be a Pechanga Youth Council representative and have successfully been elected by the Pechanga Tribal Youth, three years in a row. Furthermore, I take my education very seriously, and I'm always putting my best foot forward when it comes to my schooling. My goal is to attend college and build a career in Native American Law to better my Native community and the Native Americans of this nation.

Faith Pojas (La Jolla Band of Luiseno Indians)

Hello, my name is Faith Pojas. I am from the La Jolla Band of Luiseño Indians and currently a senior at Valley Center High School. After school, I plan on furthering my education at select colleges, which include: University California of San Diego, University California of Santa Cruz, or California State University of Monterey Bay.

I will major in Marine and Environmental Studies. I know we have tribal lands and culturally important areas that need protecting. My minor will be in music journalism so I can continue to explore what I love, music and writing.

I am more than excited to graduate and go to college. With the help of AIR, I have learned to better my research and writing abilities to prepare me for the path I will go on.







Jayla Pete (Federated Indians of Graton Rancheria)

I am Jayla Pete. I am 17 years old. I am a senior attending Lowell High School, one of the best rated public high schools in California. I live with my dad, mom, younger brother, and my lovable dog, Buddy. At Lowell, I excel in my schoolwork, whether the learning is in person or online. I have maintained a high GPA throughout my academic school years while participating in a multitude of clubs and other extracurricular activities. To start, I joined my school's Latin Club to enrich my thoughts apart from my core classes in Roman culture and I continue to study the language because Latin is useful in the science and law fields, which are part of my ideal career goals. I am also a part of the PAWS clubs (Protecting Animals Without Shelters), in which volunteers help at animal adoption events and support animals by either holding a fundraiser or collecting needed supplies for the animals. One of my interests that I expanded by my own initiative in school is playing the trombone. Currently, I am the president of my school's jazz band, and the lead trombonist, allowing me to step out of my comfort zone in terms of having to manage multiple parts as a leader and a musician. Tribal Youth Court Update

As mentioned in our last Newsletter we are having tremendous success with our Tribal Youth Court Project in partnership with the Intertribal Court of Southern California (ICSC), where we continue to develop and offer training for the youth peer court jury through restorative justice concepts.

To summarize our project, our collaboration with the ICSC on the development of a Tribal Youth Peer Court, as a diversion-based court, will serve our San Diego County Tribes and Native youth. We plan to hold a small mock hearing as a test run for the youth court in November. Finally, in December, as part of our youth court peer decision maker training ,we will host a Tribal Youth Court Moot Court for our final exam, where the students will face off to argue their side of the Indian law court case that will be the subject of the moot court. In the past our students have showed a command of these cases and we are always amazed and proud of how well they all grasp these complex concepts. Perhaps it's because these cases are about their communities...
