Tribal Youth Peer Court/Honors Updates

Preparing for Summer 23 we will add Palomar College to a list of growing collaborators that are dedicated in having our Native Youth succeed within education. We will offer an academic success course to prepare our Native Youth who take our university course Introduction Tribal Legal Studies at UCSD, taught by Intertribal Court Judge, Angela Medrano Esq. (Cahuilla) who also teaches Federal Indian Law at the University of San Diego Law School.



Working with UCSD Extension we will offer a certificate in restorative justice through the courses taken at both UCSD and SDSU. We thank all our community collaborators on their work with us in supporting our Native Youth.

A quick glance at our Honors Project

AIR Programs has partnered with numerous universities with the ideal that our Native Youth can compete at the university level. From our partnership with UCLA to our latest partnership with Intertribal Court of Southern California / UCSD / SDSU / and Palomar College \sim we have added up all our AIR Student Admissions for the last 9 years.

Initially our collaboration started the concept of utilizing existing university level courses that were based in Tribal Law and Governance and applied them to our Native Youth. We had great success in our implementation of this program. In 2019 we were afforded the opportunity to further engage our Native Youth with our more recent community-based partners (ICSC/UCSD/ SDSU and Palomar College) in training the Peer Decision Makers for the Tribal Youth Court. Here, they would utilize their knowledge in restorative justice to participate as a peer jurist within the Tribal Youth Court at Intertribal Court of Southern CA.

Above we show our passage rates which demonstrates our students understanding of the topics and their success in taking advanced university coursework. The following documentation shows were these students have gone, in the last 9 years, in pursuing higher education.



We started with a small group in 2015 and over the next 9 years our students have been going to some of the top universities in the Nation.

Having these courses from our pool of universities are making our students stand out, as it shows their dedication to academics.

Numbers reflect only those who we could track. There are many more whom we did not have the opportunity to track.

AIR Programs Summer Honors Courses Enrolling Now / Accepting applications

This summer we are collaborating with Palomar College in offering Coun110 College Success Skills, a 3-unit course, from Palomar College. This course is transferable to both UC/CSU in California. This course assists the students in preparing for the rigor of university academics. At the CSU level this is a required course and has demonstrated results in improving college success. This course will be online and mentor assistance will be given to the students.

Course: Coun110 College Success Skills - 3 units

College: Palomar College

Purpose: Provides students with skills, tools, and techniques to reach educational objectives including time management, test taking, note taking, reading comprehension, memory development and more. This course is also available online. For High School Students 9-12th grades.

Congratulations to Judge Sunshine S. Sykes on her appointment as a US District Judge for the Central District of California

We congratulate US District Judge Sunshine S. Sykes for her appointment to the US District Court for the Central District of California. She marks only the third Native Woman serving as a Federal Judge. She earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from Stanford University in 1997 and a Juris Doctor from Stanford Law School in 2001. She was a staff attorney at California Indian Legal Services before being nominated by Governor Jerry Brown to serve as a judge on the Riverside County Superior Court.

We thank her as in 2018 she served as a judge in our Moot Court for our AIR-UCLA course "Introduction to Tribal Legal Studies". Her belief in supporting our students demonstrates not only her dedication to our Native Communities but represents some of the best ideals within Indian Country.
