Jaselle Fugitt (Rosebud Sioux Tribe)

I'm involved in many leadership programs at my school but often felt disconnected from my culture as I live far away from many of my Native American relatives. I am grateful for the people at Graton Rancheria allowing me to have the opportunity to be included to learn more about Indigenous culture through their programs. Their work is incredible but also their collaborative efforts with many programs, it is here, they introduced me to their collaborative partner AIR Programs. AIR allowed me to not only get involved in understanding Federal and Tribal law but also taught me the fundamentals on college. During the AIR Program I took university courses at SDSU and UCSD to learn about the Tribal Legal System and Restorative Justice. Although I participate in many academic programs I also participate in many other programs including AVID, the varsity cheer team, and IB. I have not only learned how to be a leader for my school but now my culture. and part of a dual enrollment program, taking classes through Grand Canyon University and Palomar College. This opportunity has allowed me to challenge myself academically while preparing for my future. My goal is to attend a university next fall, where I plan to major in American Indian Studies and minor in Dance. Looking forward, I aspire to earn a teaching degree so that I can return to my community and give back in meaningful ways. I hope to teach our language, preserving and passing on traditions that are essential to our identity, or open a studio based on the reservation to teach multiple styles of dance, but hopefully both.

Dance has been a part of my life since I was three years old. It is more than just movement for me; it is a way to connect to myself, my mind, and my soul. Through dance, I find balance, strength, and a way to express who I am. My passion for it is something I hope to carry into my studies and eventually share with others. My leadership is rooted in cultural pride, service, and a vision for the future. I represent the next generation of Native leaders grounded in tradition, yet unafraid to embrace new challenges in order to create opportunities for my community and make my elders proud. It was amazing to have taken AIR courses throughout my freshman and sophomore year! I couldn't have been so grateful for this opportunity to guide my focus to the career I want to pursue. I've taken both UCSD and SDSU courses and passed them to my surprise as a freshman who knew nothing about taking University level classes before attending High School. I am currently a Senior and actively participating in clubs and activities within and outside of school. I'm an open person to do anything. I love the arts, crafting and performing. I have been in my school's Drama Club since my freshman year. I sew and crochet outside of school and tend my garden. I participate in student government and in my District's Youth Advisory Council. Tribal Legal Education and Juvenile Justice

It has been a over a decade since the first ideals of developing a Tribal Youth (Peer) Court started. We started with this journey at UCLA and continued our march towards juvenile jusice through our collaborative efforts with UCSD Extension and San Diego State University Dept of American Indian Studies. After year 4 we came up with the development of a Tribal Youth Peer Court model, utilizing our Native youth as Peer Jurors, who have received training through our Restorative Justice Project.

This training/coursework has been a major component of the TYC's project and has allowed our Peer Jurist to understand the ideals of Tribal law while emphasizing the pivotal role peers play in youth decision-making. A peer jury capitalizes on the influence of positive peer pressure to help divert the participant away from further misconduct.

Our first hearing occurred in year 8, and our Peer Jury demonstrated a remarkable level of professionalism, applying their training with confidence and bringing valuable youth perspectives to the proceedings. Their contributions not only enhanced the fairness through Tribal understanding but also reflected their commitment to the well-being of their communities.

We are proud of our work in developing this is a massive project. It involves our regional universities (UCSD and SDSU), our Tribal Court, San Diego County Juvenile Courts, our Consortium Tribes and numerous volunteers. Among many of our "firsts" that AIR Programs has had, this project is one of the first in Indian Country done in this unique model. Congratulations to our team, our community and all those who worked on this project!







Congratulations to our Micro Certificate Awardees

Congratulations to our Native Youth who have earned their Micro Certifications through our Restorative Justice Project. Our restorative justice series is intended for participants to gain a broad understanding of restorative justice concepts and their importance in wellness and healthy functioning of individuals, families, and communities.

These courses provide an overview of the Tribal, State and Federal legal systems along with Tribal Governance structures. Included in these courses, students will understand important Tribal legal studies ideals, including tribal government and court structures, the history of tribal court systems and implementation of tribal court criminal and civil jurisdiction.

Courses begin with an introduction to concepts of legal studies and progress into understanding restorative justice through our Tribal Legal studies course with an emphasis on contemporary tribal legal issues. The program curriculum blends skill building and facilitation development with academic, cultural, and spiritual understandings of restorative justice ideals and dispute resolution for implementation and sustainability.
