Happy New Year!!!

This year was another challenging year but despite Covid-19, and its variants, AIR Programs has continued to work with our Native Youth through our mentoring/tutoring projects, our restorative justice project and our community giving program this last year.

This last November, we delivered Thanksgiving Turkeys to our Native Families in the rural regions of San Diego County. We followed this by working with Intertribal Court, Southern California Indian Centers and Toy for Tots to deliver Christmas Toys to Native Families within the San Diego Region.

This last year, for the first time, we had 100% passage within our Native Law Based courses/trainings that our Native High School students are taking. These courses/training are in combination of our restorative justice project where our participants will join our Native Peer Court jury assisting in developing wellness plans for those who deserve a second chance. In 2022, we are ready to have hearings for this diversion based project.

Finally, on November 4th, we were able to resume our Annual Honoring Banquet for our students who have excelled within our program and within their academics. Although Covid has slowed us down, we have come up with some solutions to our challenges and slowly, we are making our way back to a full program foe 2022.

We thank all those programs that have teamed up with us to make these great events occur. We look forward to a great 2022!!!



AIR Honors Project Training/Courses Starting in February

Today we are happy to announce our Spring 2022 Course/Training. This Spring, in collaboration with San Diego State University – American Indian Studies, we are seeking Native High School Youth to participate within a university Freshman Level Writing Course, that concentrates its content on Tribal Governance.

Course:	AMIND 120 Writing and Rhetoric / Course is online and is A-synchronous allowing our students to learn on their own pace, within a weekly timeframe
Start:	Feb. 14th
Units:	3 units
University:	San Diego State University

This course is part of training for students, Native High School Youth, to potentially sit on our Peer Court Jury to assist in developing wellness plans for those Native Youth who have gone on a path that is not within the customs and norms of our communities. By understanding Tribal governance, they will understand the differing ideals within our Tribal communities. This understanding, in turn, will guide our peer jury in the development of appropriate wellness plans based on community ideals.

The course itself is a writing course, but utilizes our content to teach both writing skills and understanding of the content.

This is a university course and will have our students dedicating at least 6-8 hours a week of homework time. We will utilize university mentors for the students to help digest and understand the materials.

Restorative Justice Training at 2 years

We have initiated our Restorative Justice Trainings for our Native High School Students with the purpose of having our students understand the differences between our Native Community ideals and the outside non-Native constructs of government and justice. In turn, this understanding will help them in creating a more informed and appropriate Native ideal wellness plan while they serve as a jury within the Native Youth Peer Court, from the Intertribal Court of Southern California.

Within our two years of implementation we are seeing great success through higher completion rates.

We tend to believe that students accomplish and have more success when the instruction is about them, about Native ideals, as our students rarely see this being taught in public schools.

As our story began, AIR Programs started with Native Students wanting to address the low numbers of Native People pursuing higher education at San Diego State University. Across the Nation (generally), Native students make up less than 1% of the student population on any university campus. This has held for the last 30 years. AIR Programs continues to assists our students to pursue higher education each year. Last year admissions and acceptances have included Columbia, Dartmouth, UCLA, SDSU, Cal, USD and more.

With this in mind, AIR Programs and San Diego State University have developed a working partnership through a Memorandum of Understanding to address this deficit. This includes a designated office at SDSU within the Center for Inclusive Excellence (CIE) in the Professional Studies & Fine Arts building. Our office will be designated as, "The Center for Native Youth Advancement in Education and Tribal Governance."

This Center will serve as a focal point in which we roll out our Restorative Justice Project for Native Youth and combine our mentoring projects to work with our Native Youth in their academics and navigating the educational system.

We are honored by the continued support from San Diego State University and thank the President's Office and the Department of American Indian Studies for this!
